Interactions with medicines, food and alcohol Ibuprofen can react unpredictably with certain other medicines. It's usually safe to drink alcohol while taking ibuprofen. You can buy most types of ibuprofen from pharmacies and supermarkets. It works by reducing hormones that cause pain and swelling in the body. Ibuprofen gel can be called Fenbid, Ibugel and Ibuleve. How to cope with side effects What to do about: If you take ibuprofen 3 times a day, leave at least 6 hours between doses.
